Visioning-Next Step: A Church-wide Study

In January 2016, the deacons met and decided to make prayer the centerpiece of deacon ministry for the year. Each meeting began with an extended period of prayer. I shared a little history or lesson about prayer, offered some instruction on some prayer method, and then we prayed. Gradually, we felt God leading us to ask, *What next?* The deacons spent time thinking about visioning, growing, and leading the church into the twenty-first century.

A few months ago, we started discussing visioning during church council meetings. We explored the future and thought together about what it might look like. In this space, in September, I invited members to join the deacons and other leaders in prayer about the future of KBC, and I hope that you have been praying about the future, about the visioning process, and about God's direction. Most importantly, let us move through this process together. Let visioning be an opportunity to grow as a church.

At the deacon retreat in September, the deacons looked at visioning in greater detail. We asked questions like, *Where do we want to go? How do we want to get there? Where do we feel God is leading us?* We discussed the difference between **who we are** and **what we do**. What we do is a reflection of who we are. Before we can decide what we are going to do, we must answer the question: who are we? In visioning, we are seeking to answer this question. For example, are we evangelistic? Are we mission-minded? Do we advocate for justice? Are we a chapel to meet the spiritual needs of those who are already here? The key questions must have the verb **to be**, not to do.

Part of the deacon retreat explored the process of visioning. The deacons, Pastor Carolyn, and I agreed that a church-wide study would help the congregation unify in the visioning process. We will find a book and invite people to join small groups for a 10-week study. Since prayer has been an integral part of this process, and, in many ways, preceded it, we will conclude the church-wide study with 40 days of prayer. The deacons have set a target number of participants for the small group study. They have covenanted together to encourage the congregation to find a group to join. With greater participation will come a deeper vision that is more reflective of the congregation. **The process will begin with a special worship service on January 1**.

Each small group will make visioning suggestions, especially in their last four meetings. A visioning committee from within the church council will put these suggestions together, share them with the congregation, organize additional listening/sharing sessions, and draft a vision. After further listening sessions, the congregation will have the opportunity to vote on the vision at the April business meeting.

Visioning is a collective activity. No one person can do it alone. We can share ideas, discuss them, be open to new ways, think outside the box, ask what other churches are doing, and follow when the Holy Spirit leads. Together we can cast a vision for the future. And, together we can live out God's vision for KBC.

Greetings from Myanmar! Hope this news update and prayer needs finds you well. Thank you always for your prayer and financial support. Please continue to pray for us and support us. Following is our latest ministry update:

VICTORY CENTER FOR ACADEMICS (VCA)

Over the last two months we faced several circumstances which we had to deal with: final payment for rental cost, parents complaining about teachers and some students



leaving the school; thank God things are going better now. We have more parents inquiring, teachers are more dedicating, and improving in their teaching. We have teacher-parent conference on Aug. 26; it went well; we praise the Lord for that. Please continue to pray for us so that we can give clear answers to parents regarding partner school before the end of this year. Also that we can have air conditioner in each classroom, and be able to start computer class,

starting from this month.

WATER FILTER & HUMANITARIAN AID

As Myanmar is still in monsoon season which is followed by flood in several places; many disadvantaged communities are facing clean water problem. The southern part of Myanmar is



these days. Our ministry is building Bio-sand water filtration system in the northern part of Myanmar for flood victims. However, we could not build many; please pray so that we can build many more water filtration systems. We are also praying for providing water filtration systems and rice to flood victims in Yangon & Ayeyawaddy delta areas. Please continue to pray also for earthquake victims; a strong 6.8

magnitude earthquake hit the historical sight of Bagan area, Myanmar on Aug. 24. Few people died and injured; however a lot of Buddhist historical temples were destroyed.

MISSION & INTERNATIONAL CHURCH

The mission church I am directing is going well. We have 3 mission centers. We need your prayer support for our missionaries so that they can win souls. Please continue to pray also for starting English speaking church in our area.
